Bergquist named 2008 Air Force Male Athlete of the Year

Tech. Sergeant Michael Bergquist, Washington Air National Guard member, has not only crossed first over 19 finish lines throughout the year but has also set 11 new course records in triathlons, duathlons, and road races ranging from two miles up to the marathon. These accomplishments earned Bergquist the title of Air Force Male Athlete of the Year for 2008.

Each year the Air Force Services Agency selects one male and female for its top award among the Air Force, Air Force Reserves and Air National Guard combined. With over 700,000 officers, enlisted and civilian Air Force members this is a tremendous honor to be selected. Many of his races are not military sponsored events; however, he can easily be spotted wearing his National Guard or Air Force racing attire at every event he competes in.

Bergquist is a multi-sport endurance athlete who typically competes in swimming, biking, running, or any combination of the three in events lasting from less than ten minutes to nearly three hours. In 2008, his race categories consisted of nine running races, including one marathon and two half marathons. Three events were duathlons, which included a bike ride between two runs. In his primary sport

of triathlon, he finished first seven times. "It's important to be active in the community and to demonstrate that military members are fit to fight," said Bergquist.

In 1997, he was told due to an injury that his days of competing were over. He actually had to start from the beginning as he could barely walk for three months. "While starting over with walking, I realized that nothing is certain until I quit, which I could never do to myself," said Bergquist. He hasn't missed a day of training in over five years. Each year builds on the previous year when training for an event. He doesn't believe in a single excuse regarding injury, illness, weather or time. "Any exercise program without excuses is better than a brilliant plan that's not followed," said Bergquist.

He uses his love of sport as a recruiting tool for the National Guard and Air Force.

"It's a great way to recruit from within the unique demographic of athletes. Our military sports programs encourage the highest levels of fitness and competition, which trickle down throughout all the ranks," said Bergquist.

He has competed in the Lincoln National Guard Marathon Championships for the last five years. All five times he's earned a spot on the National Guard's Elite Marathon Team, which is funded as a recruiting program. This program is directly responsible for generating more than 3,000 quality leads. He has also been selected in each of the last six years to compete as a triathlete on the All Air Force Triathlon Team at the Armed Forces Triathlon Championships. On four occasions he's qualified for the All Military World Championship Team USA. He is the only triathlete from

any branch of the military to compete in each of the last three, which includes the first ever triathlon at the Military World Games.

His inspiration of fitness has not only reached other athletes and the general public but this love for the marathon has now extended to his family. The 141st Air Refueling Wing Medical Squadron has enlisted Michael's wife, Amanda Bergquist, who was selected for the Washington National Guard Marathon Team and has goals of qualifying for the National Guard's Elite Marathon Team where she can join her husband.

Along with his sports competitions and military accomplishments, Bergquist has also been recognized for an act that goes beyond any trophy or recognition. During one of his many events a kayaker found herself trapped in rushing waters and was drowning. Bergquist, without a moment of hesitation, was able to swim through the cold and fast-moving water and rescued the potential victim. As a result of this act he was awarded the Red Cross Military Hometown Hero Award, Pitsenbarger award and the state Guardsman Medal for Heroism.

"It was a scary situation, but the cost of inaction was too great. I did what I'd hope anyone else would do if that were me," said Bergquist.

The 36-year old who spends his time working in the 242 Combat Communications Squadron has accomplished an endless list of both personal and professional goals but still has more that he wants to do. He has trained for 15 years and his hope is to qualify for the World Class Athlete Program (WCAP). His next steps are to gain sponsors to support him in even higher level competitions.

Bergquist has had many proud moments in the spotlight of fame and when reflecting on one of his favorites he said, "My first military world championship which was in Holland in 2003 they announced my name, rank and country. I stepped forward, waved, dove into the water and waited for the triathlon to begin. For a moment, the world was my stage. Only two groups of people get to wear the US uniform: athletes and military. To be both at the same time made all those years of training worthwhile," said Bergquist.

Spokane area citizen-soldiers deploy in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom

The Washington National Guard bid farewell to approximately 50 citizen soldiers from the Spokane based 1041st Transportation Company in a ceremony held on Saturday, March 7 at the Spokane Readiness Center located at 1626 North Rebecca Street.

The deploying soldiers from the 1041st will augment approximately 100 additional citizen soldiers from the 1161st Transportation Company headquartered in Ephrata. This combined force will train at Camp Atterbury, Indiana for a few months and deploy to Iraq

later this spring. Under the current Department of Defense policy, these citizen soldiers are slated to be on federal active duty for 12 months plus any leave time they accrue. They are scheduled to arrive home from their deployment in March 2010.

The general mission of the 1041st and 1161st soldiers will be long-haul truck driving using tractor/trailers. The soldiers will take individual equipment with them, but will receive unit equipment and vehicles upon arrival in theater

The 1161st previously served in Iraq from February 2003 to August 2004. During their first tour in Iraq, they logged more than one million miles on the road.

The citizen soldiers and airmen of the Washington National Guard are dedicated to the mission of safeguarding lives and property in Washington State, and serving as sentinels for freedom overseas. Citizen soldiers come from every community, profession and background from around the State - they are Neighbors Helping Neighbors Through a Tradition of Service.

McKinley visits Guardmembers during CENTCOM trip

BALAD AIR BASE, Iraq (3/4/09) – The National Guard's first four-star general visited with citizen-soldiers and -airmen serving in Afghanistan, Iraq and Kuwait this week in dozens of formal briefings, town hall meetings and tours to "gauge their thoughts" about the missions they are performing.

"I feel it's important to visit the Soldiers and Airmen of the National Guard in theater," said Gen. Craig McKinley, the chief of the National Guard Bureau. "To see how they are doing, talk to their commanders, and visit as many of their organizations as I can to see what the conditions are and to answer any questions they may have of me."

McKinley has been the chief for just over 100 days, and his recent appointment comes at a time when more than 60,000 Guard forces are serving in Operations Enduring Freedom and Iraqi Freedom.

At each stop, he expressed his appreciation for the troops. "Look at the places and the people that you affect," he told Guard members at Sather Air Base, Iraq, Feb 28. "I can't tell you how grateful I am for what you are doing for the Guard, your nation and this country."

He offered similar sentiments at Ali Al Salem Air Base, Kuwait, at Balad Air Base, Iraq, and at Camp Phoenix and Bagram Air Base in Afghanistan, among other locations.



Maj. Gen. Emmett Titshaw Jr., assistant to Chief of Staff of the U.S. Air Force, and the Guard Bureau's Command Sgt. Maj. David Hudson accompanied him.

In Iraq, McKinley was briefed by Air Guard members of the 332nd Air Expeditionary Wing at Balad Air Base, Iraq. The unit's more than 180 Airmen help operate a joint forces control center that manages the air space of Iraq and coordinates air support for multinational forces.

From the base's control tower, he got a panoramic view of the OIF mission outside Baghdad. He also toured the 332nd Joint Theatre Hospital, the largest medical and critical care facility in that country, manned by active duty, Guard and Reserve service members.

McKinley also visited Minnesota Army Guard Soldiers of Task Force 34, 834th Air Support Battalion and climbed aboard an MRAP and other uparmored Army vehicles with Washington Guard Soldiers of the 161st Infantry Regiment at a motor pool.

McKinley and Hudson asked the Guard members what was on their minds: "Your questions and concerns are important to me," McKinley said to them during a luncheon Feb. 28 at Camp Liberty, Iraq. "I will take them back to Washington."

Future operations, living conditions, deployment lengths, health and veteran care, equipment, mobilization training and other issues were the questions he and Hudson answered from the troops.

Economic conditions affecting employers and families back home were also among troop concerns. "We will get through this," McKinley assured them, but he said that future and recent challenges will test the Guard like never before.

McKinley held a town hall meeting with Guard Soldiers from several states including Illinois and New York at Camp Phoenix outside Kabul, Afghanistan, March 2 and with active duty and Guard service members at Bagram Air Base March 3, including those supporting Combined Joint Task Force 101.

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Celebrating 85 years of 141st History

The First Commander

When the 116th Observation Squadron received federal recognition on August 6, 1924, Major John T. Fancher became the unit's first commander. He was the son of a wheat farmer from Espanola, Washington, who volunteered for the newly formed aviation corps during the World War I. He eventually commanded an air combat unit until the end of the war.

During the first few years of the unit, Maj. Fancher led the founding members consisting of 14 officers and 50 enlisted men through difficult times. Many members, including the Commander himself, contributed their time and energy assembling the steel and tin for the WWI retread hangars at Felts Field. When the planes first arrived money had not been allocated to the unit. Maj. Fancher used his personal credit to purchase the first 15 gallons of fuel for the JN-6-A2 "Jennies".

Spokane had secured the National Air Races in May 1927. Maj. Fancher was the driving force behind organizing and running the air derby. He enlisted local leaders as newspaper owner William H. Cowles, lumberman Milton McGoldrick, investment tycoon Harlan I. Peyton, hotel owners Victor Dessert and Louis M. Davenport and a host of others to contribute their time, financial support, influence, and organizational skills to its success.

Maj. Fancher flew to New York and back in his O-2C bi-plane to drum up publicity and make arrangements along the routes of the races.

He took the long route home to stop by South Dakota and the summer home of President Calvin Coolidge. After performing some aerobatic maneuvers over the household, Fancher threw a weighted banner to the ground that read "Greetings to the President." He landed to invite the President to Spokane for the Air Races. President Coolidge had to decline the invitation, but was impressed enough to pause for a picture with Maj. Fancher. The

banner is on display in the lobby of 141st Air Refueling Wing Building.


When Charles A. Lindbergh made his epic trans-Atlantic flight on May 21, 1927, aviation drew national and international attention. Major Fancher had been on hand to greet Lindbergh upon his return to New York from France and invited him to be Spokane's guest at the air derby. Lindbergh had to cancel, but he included Spokane on a tour and added to the anticipation of the air derby to begin nine days later.

In April of 1928, Maj. Fancher and the 116th were asked to perform at Wenatchee's ninth Annual Apple Blossom Festival and the grand opening of their new airport. Maj. Fancher dropped bright delayed ignition fuse bombs over the heads of the crowd from his airplane. He then joined Capt. Neely and Lt. Haynes in close three-ship twists, turns and loops, all in the dead of night. After the show, Maj. Fancher was concerned about three of the crude matchstick-type fuse bombs that hadn't

ignited which were still in his plane.

Fearing the malfunctioning munitions would hurt someone, Fancher took the bombs to an empty field nearby to destroy them. The third one exploded after the fuse was lit in his hands fatally injuring him.

With time growing short, Maj. Fancher gave his last in-



Maj. John T. Fancher, the first 116th OS Commander, WWI veteran and airpower pioneer passed away at the Wenatchee hospital with his wife at his side. Condolences poured in from political leaders and famous aviators from all across the United States; including Eddie Rickenbacker, WWI Top Ace.

Thousands attended his funeral at the Masonic Temple with hundreds of others lining the streets. At his burial, the 116th Observation Squadron flew over Riverside Cemetery in formation and dropped flowers on the service. In honor of his achievements, the road leading up to Felts Field was renamed Fancher Road.

For a while, the airfield at Wenatchee bore the name Fancher Field until 1931. On top of Beacon Hill lays a forgotten light beacon tower with a plaque that commemorated the event.

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Building locations change while mission continues

Both wings at Fairchild have been busy with changes and new challenges associated in the Total Force Integration of the 141st and 92nd Air Refueling Wing. The members of these wings continue to prove that they are willing, able and excited about the opportunities which occur with each change.

One of the latest changes has been the move of the 141st ARW Operations Group from Building 445 to Building 2005, located at the intersection of O'Malley Avenue and Arnold Street.

The physical move took about two days and included the work of contractors and full-time Guard members. This effort completed about 90 percent of the move. Completing the final details which will make it home are still to come.

Lt. Col. Mike Boyington, 141 ARW Operations Support Flight Commander, has been involved with the move from detailed decision planning for office furniture placement to painting a backdrop of blue skies to accent the Wing's display of the JN-6-A2 "Jenny". "The Total Force Integration is about efficiency. This move was an important step for the Guard and it is good that Operations could take the lead," said Boyington.

Building 2005 is a much newer building with more space available than the previous Operations location; however, not every work center in Operations could move. Intelligence, due to security and vault regulations will not be co-located in Building 2005. Command Post will also not be part of the move at this time. These inabilities to co-locate will present some new challenges for the team but mission success will still continue.

"The 141st and 92nd have always worked as a team and now this team has a title of Total Integration Force. It was a myth that we were never integrated. I have deployed twice with the 92nd as a Guardsman in the past," said Boyington.

The design of Building 2005 allows aircrew to perform their pre-flight and post-flight duties in a more convenient manner with mission planning rooms, plans and scheduling, flight gear and other critical elements of mission planning all co-located. There is also a conference room, which will be used for aircrew ground school training, and an auditorium with a stage.

This move is one of the first but not to be the last as the two Wings physically integrate over time. Other building moves are still in the planning stages and as with any change it will be a time of adjustment but more importantly an opportunity to encounter new experiences.

Coulston is responsible for balancing and executing the unit's funding. He was directly responsible for the procurement of over \$450,000.00 in unfunded money to purchase needed LOGDET items that were impacting the units SORTS reports.

Another noted accomplishment was securing \$256,000.00 in O&M funds to purchase

needed equipment and install a modern weapons rack system to store 141 SFS, 92 SFS, and 141 Honor Guard weapons.

He also coordinated with the 92 SFS to assist the 141 SFS in putting on an Expeditionary Combat Skills Training class for the 141 ARW while Providing a Security Team for the 2008 Mission Support Group Conference in Spokane.

Security Forces National Guard Bureau (NGB) requested Coulston to assist with the 2009 National ANG Security Forces Conference and is currently the coordinator for the vendor show for the 2009 and 2010 conference.
